Letter, 8 July 1863, from Charlie [-----], a Union soldier at Fort Scott, near Alexandria, Virginia, to Emma in Litchfield, Connecticut, discussing the celebration in camp during the 4th of July and for recent victories such as the capture of Vicksburg and Battle of Gettysburg. Dorothea Lynde Dix (April 4, 1802 – July 17, 1887) was an American advocate on behalf of the indigent mentally ill who, through a vigorous and sustained program of lobbying state legislatures and the United States Congress, created the first generation of American mental asylums. During the Civil War, she served as a Superintendent of Army Nurses. 3023 - MUSTER ROLL COMPANY K, 5TH MARYLAND VOLUNTEERS AFTER THE BATTLE OF ANTIETAM, Pre-printed and filled in, 21" X 22", listed of 73 officers and enlisted me in Captain Better's Company, one listed as wounded at the Battle of Antietam September 17th and sent to the General Hospital in Washington October 17th. On the eve of the Civil War, Natchez, Mississippi, was the richest city per capita in the country. Massive plantations sprawled across the rich soil of the Mississippi Delta.
